



Continuing our popular Talk Story “Pau Hana” event series in partnership with Zocalo Public Square and Hawaii Public Radio (HPR) — over 150 people gathered on Thursday, February 21st to talk story on a timely topic, "How Much Tourism is Too Much?"

HPR host Catherine Cruz moderated a panel of experts featuring Executive Director of the Center for Responsible Travel Martha Honey, public policy researcher and former president of the Hawai'i Economic Association John Knox, cultural tourism specialist and former Office of Hawaiian Affairs trustee Peter Apo, and Frank Haas, marketing consultant and former vice president of tourism marketing at the Hawai'i Tourism Authority.



With 2018 marking the seventh straight year of record tourist arrivals and historically high tax receipts, the discussion focused on how to “manage” the number of visitors coming into Hawaii, the categories of “optimal visitors” we want to attract, balancing Hawaii’s carrying capacity against our largest economic sector and generation of tax revenues.



The discussion touched on the impact growth has had on our environment and quality of life. Attendees continued chatting after the panel concluded over some ono lup cheong fried rice provided by from Broken Rice on Waialae!

## A Conversation with Geoffrey Canada

Senator Inouye was a strong advocate of education, as the ultimate equalizer. Throughout his career, he sought to level the playing field by increasing opportunities for all children regardless of their zip code. So, when the chance arose to partner with the Harold K.L. Castle Foundation, Hawaii Community Foundation, Hawaii Pacific Health and Kamehameha Schools to bring one of the nation's premier educational reform thought leaders to our local education community, DKII jumped at the chance! We were honored to assist with the preparation and logistics for the event.

In the presence of a true education rock star, on March 11<sup>th</sup> over four hundred Hawaii educators and community leaders were lifted up and inspired by Geoffrey Canada of the Harlem Children's Zone at the Neal Blaisdell Center. Educators, education supporters and community leaders flew in from the neighbor islands and drove in from all corners of Oahu. Amazing and inspiring!



*"Hope is as contagious as despair,"* said Canada. Reinvigorating and applauding all who work *"in the deep end of the pool,"* he reminded us that even in the most hopeless situations, we must fight to *"save that one."* He also reminded us that teaching is a most noble career to be supported and honored, and that it truly takes a village to fully prepare a child for adulthood. We each have a role to play.
